World Water Council Conference: "Water Security: A Pathway To Sustainable Development"

2015 marks turning point for water security

World Water Council hosts water policy and stakeholder event in Washington D.C. Calls for collective action

Washington D.C., United States of America, 20 March 2015 – Today, the World Water Council, co-organizer of the World Water Forum, is bringing together nearly 150 prominent policy makers and stakeholders from across the nation to address critical water security issues in the context of adapting to climate change.

A decade ago, water merited little attention and support from global decision-makers, business and opinion leaders. Today, the script is very different. The impacts of water on populations and societies worldwide demonstrate that water security is increasingly important as a pathway to sustainable development.

"A huge challenge lies ahead of us: we must invent our water future together. To succeed, we need the political decision-makers and the international community to come together to implement changes", said Benedito Braga, President of the World Water Council. "Through investment in water security, we will guarantee security in most other domains, including energy, environment, food, and health."

"As the SDG dialogue and negotiations enter the last mile, we must concentrate and mobilize all our efforts to make sure water is appreciated, not only as an end in itself, but as a means for sustainable development as a whole", said Benedito Braga. "The year 2015 is not an opportunity the world can afford to miss. There is no time to waste."

In 2015, the international community has a once-in-a-generation opportunity to secure water for our future.

The World Water Council considers the formulation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to be an endeavor of the highest importance to ensure a prosperous and equitable future for humankind. No development can occur without the necessary water security to nurture sustainable development. And, water is the common thread connecting all of the SDGs. A dedicated water goal is an absolute necessity and critical as part of the Post-2015 development agenda with measurable targets and indicators in support of life, well-being, economic and social development and the environment.

It will also be composed of cultural events, prize ceremonies, side events, a water exhibition, and a Citizen's Forum, including a Youth and Children's Forum, to raise awareness around water issues. The 7th World Water Forum is jointly organized by the World Water Council and the Republic of Korea together with the city of Daegu and the Province of Gyeongbuk.
