# WATER SECURITY TAKES CENTER STAGE AT UNESCO CONFERENCE

On 13 May, the World Water Council participated in UNESCO's International Water Conference "Leveraging Intersectorality for Sustainable Water Security and Peace." Speaking to participants during the opening high-level panel on water, President Loic Fauchon revealed the Council's four overarching priorities for the coming years. The priorities are complementary to WWC's triennial strategy and will steer the organization's activities throughout the next two years.

"We must increase the availability of water by building storage space, developing desalination and encouraging water reuse. Engaging in active hydro-diplomacy through the prisms of knowledge, finance and governance will be key to our success." He added that Africa will be an important player in providing visible and concrete answers to global water challenges during the 9<sup>th</sup> World Water Forum in Dakar, Senegal.

Echoing the theme of the conference, President Fauchon referred to the five-finger alliance: "Technical solutions exist. We must now convince national governments, parliamentarians, and local authorities to adopt an intersectoral and horizontal approach in managing this precious resource."

The Conference was opened by Director-General of UNESCO Audrey Azoulay and Minister of Water of Senegal Serine Thiam. It brought together international stakeholders, decision makers and political representatives to provide economic, social and environmental solutions to help achieve water for all by 2030.

"I look very much forward to the 9th World Water Forum in Senegal in 2021, with its very relevant focus on the theme of water security. It will be another milestone in the global mobilization towards access to water and sanitation for all."

## **SIGNATURE OF AGREEMENTS**

The UNESCO Conference was also the occasion to reconfirm the long-standing partnership between UNESCO and the WWC.

On 13 May, a Partnership Agreement was signed between both organizations agreeing to carry out joint projects to strengthen science-policy interface. In addition, a letter of intent was signed between UNESCO, WWC and the the 9<sup>th</sup> World Water Forum Secretariat to collaborate towards the preparation of the Forum in Dakar in 2021.

# BRINGING DOWN BARRIERS TO CLIMATE AND WATER FINANCING

Access to finance for climate and water projects can be unlocked by strengthening country understanding financing tools and improving institutional coordination. On 17 June, the Council and Global Water Partnership (GWP) co-convened a side-event on 'Scaling Up Access to Climate Finance for Water Investments: GCF & innovative funding models' at the official UNFCCC Intersessional Climate Change Conference in Bonn.

The event included an exchange on the report co-published by the Council and GWP 'Scaling up financing: innovative funding models for water infrastructure for climate adaptation.' The report provides an overview of existing innovative financing tools for water infrastructure, to help increase funding for adaptation and achieve global climate ambitions.

# RAISING CLIMATE AMBITIONS FOR WATER

On 13 June in Bonn, Germany, the World Water Council organized the High-level Strategic Workshop on Water and Climate "Raising Ambitions on the Road to CoP25."

Bridging the outcomes of CoP24 with CoP25, the meeting met its objective of mobilizing and encouraging a range of political, governmental, institutional, technical, and scientific stakeholders, as well as NGOs and CSOs, to work together to keep water as an important element of climate discussions.

The agenda of the workshop aligned with the broader goal of implementing the Paris Agreement and focused on water as a cross-cutting solution to raise climate ambitions within the UNFCCC framework.

## INTERNATIONAL STEERING COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The 9th World Water Forum International Steering Committee (ISC) Bureau meeting, which took place on 14 May at UNESCO headquarters, decided to convene the first full ISC meeting on 17 June in Dakar. Following the ISC Bureau, President Fauchon officially nominated Paulo Salles, Rui Godinho and Youssef Filali-Meknassi as members of the ISC Bureau. At the same time, he invited Qiuchi Shi, Yoonjin Kim, Aziza Akhmouch and Rabi Mohtar to be part of the ISC as Co-Chairs of the Water Security, Cooperation, Means and Tools and Rural Development Priorities, respectively. Safaa Bahije and Mbaruku Vyakweli will also represent the Council in the Committee as members at large.

During the first ISC meeting, in Dakar, Patrick Lavarde and Abdoulaye Sene and all members will set preparations for the 9<sup>th</sup> World Water Forum in motion and discuss the details of the Kick-Off meeting.
